Beautiful historical houses in Orient, Greenport and Southold will be open from 11am to 5pm for visiting and for listening to live music performances held within each historic house. For one day, the doors of the North Fork's most beautiful historic houses will be open, while offering an extraordinary opportunity to experience live classical music in collaboration with the Arcanum String Quartet.

Arcanum String Quartet

The Arcanum String Quartet began at Stony Brook University during the fall of 2014. The Quartet is composed of members from East Carolina University and coached by violinist/pedagogue Hagai Shaham and the Emerson String Quartet. The Arcanum String Quartet is using technology to create a new way of experiencing chamber music. Through the use of LIVE streaming, the quartet allows audience members to talk with the quartet directly and see how they rehearse. Together with the quartet, the audience can explore the chamber repertoire in depth.

Chris Ferrara Founder and Artistic Director of the Ferrara Chamber Music Festival, Christopher Ferrara has appeared on stage throughout the United States and Europe as first violinist of the Triforce Quartet. He has a fervent passion for chamber music and pedagogy. He has collaborated with such artists as Phil Setzer, Paul Wakins, and Robert McDonald, and has participated in numerous chamber music festivals, including the Meadowmount School of Music. Ferrara is a DMA Candidate at Stony Brook University, studying under the Emerson Quartet and the world-renowned pedagogue, Hagai Shaham. He is on the faculty of the Music Academy of Long Island.

Johnathan Spence is a graduate of East Carolina University, where he studied with Ara Gregorian. Johnathan served as concertmaster of the ECU Symphony Orchestra, and has participated in the Next Generation Series of the Four Seasons Chamber Music Festival, during which the students selected for this program received multiple opportunities to play side-by-side with world-renowned artists. Now studying at Stony Brook University with Hagai Shaham, Johnathan is a Doctoral Candidate. Johnathan is passionate about chamber music and continues to play and perform in various chamber music festivals across the country.

Andrew Minquez, born and raised Norfolk, Virginia, began playing piano at the age of 7 and violin at 10, studying privately with Christina Morton of the Virginia Symphony. Andrew started playing the viola during his stay at East Carolina University, where he studied privately under Ara Gregorian and Melissa Reardon. Through East Carolina University's Four Seasons Chamber Music Festival, Andrew performed in master classes for prominent teaching artists such as: HsinYun Huang, Maria Lambrose, Ittai Shapira, Krzysztof Chorzelski, Robert Macdonald, Michael Kannen, Colin Carr, and Soovin Kim. Mr. Minguez graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in Viola/Violin Performance from East Carolina University. Andrew attended Innsbrook Chamber Music Festival, The Beethoven Institute at Mannes, and Heifetz International Music Institute. He was invited to perform at the Heifetz International Music Institute in 2010 and 2012. In the spring of 2012, Andrew was awarded an Honorarium to perform as a guest artist in The Four Seasons Chamber Music Festival alongside Hagai Shaham and the East Carolina University Faculty. Andrew is attending Stony Brook University in pursuit of a Masters Performance Degree in viola, where he will be studying with Nicholas Cords and Lawrence Dutton.

Jesse Smith is from Helena, Montana and began studying cello with Thad Suits. He was a member of the Helena Symphony, conducted by Alan R. Scott, for five years, where he had the opportunity to perform many large orchestral works. Throughout several summers. Jesse has attended music festivals such as the Beethoven Institute at Mannes College and the Masterworks Festival. He is a graduate of East Carolina University, and studied under Emanuel Gruber, where he attained his Bachelor of Music Performance. While at East Carolina University, he participated in many master classes with cellists such as Richard Aaron, Timothy Eddy, Colin Carr, Michael Kannen, Amit Peled, and Raman Ramakrishnan. Jesse also had the privilege to be selected as a student participant in several of Ara Gregorian's Four Seasons Next Generation concerts at East Carolina University, where he had the chance to perform with many professional artists. He is currently attending Stony Brook University, where he studies under Colin Carr and is pursuing his Masters in Music Performance.

Cliff Baldwin, composer

The Cliff Baldwin Ensemble includes Rob Shepperson, percussionist John Jinks, guitars, string bass, Yasmine Kocan cello, Lauren Schafer, violin, Sarah Fried violin, Jocabed Caraballo, viola.

Cliff was a founding member of BCR Band in Kansas City. For 30 years his audio work has been part of Dwight Frizzell's From Ark To Microchip on NPR. Recent large scale urban projections include "I Love Richmond and Richmond Loves Me", exhibited at Richmond's InLight Festival in 2010. He collaborated on three video operas Living Inside Design, Camerworld and Failing Kansas with composer Mikel Rouse which premiered at the Kitchen in New York. The Language of Light, a live cinema piece with musical score was presented at InLight in 2012 and at the Parrish Art Museum in Water Mill, NY in 2015. He most recently presented The Kepler Music in 2015 at William Paterson University's Center for New Art as artist in residence. The House of FUBB, a digital pavillion commissioned by WPU was fabricated at the Center for New Art's Robotics Lab and is on view through

May, 2016. His soundwork can be found at: CliffBaldwin.com, iTunes, Soundcloud and Bandcamp.com.

John Jinks has performed extensively in Indie rock bands throughout the 90s in NYC. He formed a noted indie rock group with Tony Award winning Broadway stars Michael Cerveris and Alice Ripley and performed extensively in NYC venues and on "Americas Talking" broadcast on cable TV. In 2000 he moved out to the east end of Long Island continuing to perform with several jazz rock influenced bands. In 2011 he formed a jazz fusion funk trio OUT EAST and continues to perform on the East End.

Drummer Rob Shepperson is a founding member, along with Mikel Rouse and Jeff Burk, of the pop group Tirez Tirez, which was active in the 1970s and 80s. When Rouse formed the new music ensemble Broken Consort, Rob contributed percussion and drum set parts. Currently, he is a member of the improv music group Strange Pools, based in Croton on Hudson, N.Y. Rob and Cliff Baldwin have been collaborating musically, and visually, ever since they met at the Kansas City Art Institute in 1978.

Paolo Bartolani, pianist

Paolo studied piano and graduates in 1989 from the S. Cecilia Music Conservatory in Rome under the guidance of Eduardo Hubert. He perfected his studies with Charles Rosen, György Sándor and Andor Foldes. From 1992 to 1996 he explored French piano repertoire with Germaine Mounier at the Ecole Normale de Musique in Paris. In 1994 he obtains his Diploma in Musicology of the 20th century under the direction of Hugues Dufourt at the Ecole des Hautes Etudes en Sciences Sociales, in collaboration with IRCAM/Centre G. Pompidou in Paris.

Paolo is a soloist and performs with chamber ensembles in Italy and France. He collaborates with cellist Rene Benedetti of the Opéra-Bastille Orchestra in Paris, with cellist Luigi Piovano of Symphony Orchestra "Santa Cecilia" in Rome and the Bernini String Quartet. He has written articles for the musicology journals Sonus-Materials for Contemporary Music and Music/Reality. In 2006, he conceived and taught a Masters Degree Program in Cultural Enterprise Administration at the University of Perugia.

Paolo was at the Venice Biennale from 2008 to 2012 as General Manager and Coordinator of the ENPARTS project - European Network of Performing Arts to promote the creation of new works in dance, music and theater and the mobility of young artists throughout Europe.

From 2009 to 2014 he was the Director of the Résonnance Italy Association, responsible for its artistic and humanitarian program, "bringing music to places where it is not heard." Over the past five years, the Association has performed more than two hundred concerts in hospitals, nursing homes and prisons in order to promote musical sensibilities and share the joy of music with those less fortunate.

Currently Paolo works for the Santa Cecilia National Academy in Rome (Italy) and for the Bologna Opera House as artistic project manager in the International Relations Sector.

Masha Carrera, soprano

Masha Carrera has studied in Rome at the "Conservatorio di Santa Cecilia" (singing and piano). She has perfected and upgraded the Mozartian repertory with Rudolf Knoll at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, the Donizettian repertory with Paolo Montarsolo and the Italian lyrical repertory with Renata Scotto at the "Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia."

She won the International Competition XXV Toti Dal Monte and was engaged to sing La Sonnanbula in the Theatres of Treviso and Rovigo. Masha Carrera's career, before exploding with the interpretation of Violetta and Lucia, has drawn her to Cologne for Klassik Komm Festival (Carmina Burana), to Bologna, Paris (Festival d'Hiver), London at the Holland Park Festival Production in Gianni Schicchi (Lauretta), New York, San Francisco, on tour in San Jose and at the Frankfurt Alte Opern, just to name a few.

Her other debuts are in Don Pasquale (Norina), Elisr d'Amore (Adina) in Rigoletto, directed by Piero Bellugi. Also under the direction of Bellugi, she has sung for the theaters of Lucca, Pisa, Livorno and Ravenna in The Straw Hat Florence (Elena).

She has sung the Rossini's Petite Messe Solennelle for the Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia,"accompanied at the piano by Michele Campanella. She has performed for the Festival of Pergolesi on Olympiad (Megacle), where she was a great success with critics and the public, the Ravenna Festival, Festival of Jesi and the Beaune Festival in France under the direction of Ottavio Dantone.

After a successful tour in Japan, with the debut in the role of Violetta in "La Traviata" by Verdi, she has received numerous invitations to bring his splendid interpretations to theaters across Europe. Richard Bonynge himself has asked her to sing her unique Violetta at his side in the Megaron Athens theater.

She was also the Matilde in the M.W. Chung production of Rossini's "Guillaume Tell." After that she was also Carolina in the Cimarosa's "II matrimonio segreto" for La Fenice Theatre in Venice, and then again the Countess (Le Nozze di Figaro) with a new tour in Japan, which ended at the "Festival Mozartiano" in Nagoya, and then again in Italy (Spoleto) with "La Traviata," followed by her debut in the difficult title role of Donizetti's "Lucia di Lammermoor."

The Long Island Composers Alliance

The Long Island Composers Alliance (LICA) was founded in 1972 by composers Marga Richter & Herbert Deutsch. On May 19, 1972, the first concert by the Long Island Composers Alliance was held at the South Huntington Public Library. Since that time LICA has presented over 300 concerts featuring more than 1500 new compositions by over 100 Long Island based composers. LICA is the only organization devoted to creating, promoting, presenting, recording and preserving the best original, contemporary music by composers living and working on Long Island. LICA is a not-for-profit decentralized performing arts organization. Concerts are presented from eastern Suffolk to New York City in venues ranging from universities, public libraries and museums to art/performance spaces and commercial music venues. Incorporated in 1975, LICA's primary mission is to represent the community of composers of the Long Island area and to present their work to a diverse audience. LICA has been funded over the years by various organizations and foundations including The Nassau County Office of Cultural Affairs. The Suffolk County Office of Cultural Arts. Long Island Arts Council, Huntington Arts Council, Hempstead Cultural Arts Center, Maldeb Foundation, Nassau County Re-Grant Programs for the Arts, Wantagh Arts Council, NY State Council on The Arts, Puffin Foundation, Prof. Edgar H. Lehrman Memorial Foundation, The Starfish Foundation, Chase Manhattan, Citibank Bank, Key Bank, Independence Savings Bank and the Brooklyn Borough President's Office.
